Pointing to Something Bigger

If you were with us Sunday or joined us on the computer, you heard me speak about "the God who's bigger," using Paul's sermon in Athens in which he tried to tell the citizens there that the reality of God is much bigger, more fundamental, and more all-encompassing than the images and altars they had set up.

Now, in the case of ancient Athens, these were idols set up to false gods. It may be hard for us to relate to that, but the story can serve as an important reminder that any images or names for God that we use are always going to be incomplete. I'm reminded of William Holladay's definition of theology, saying that it is "learning to say the least wrong thing about God." "All God-talk is wrong to some extent," he said. "The trick is to reduce the wrongness to a minimum."

But at the same time, it's also true that the symbols and images we use serve some essential purposes. For example, they serve as visual reminders of our commitments. They can serve as rallying point around a common cause. Perhaps most importantly, our symbols and images can point us to the larger reality which they represent.

Think about things like the cross, a dove, or the star of Bethlehem. These remain powerful symbols whose meaning is still known to many in the culture who may not participate in the life of a church. These and other symbols can be and have been misused, but at our best, they remind us of the story they represent and the greater reality to which they point.



As we approach Memorial Day, we're reminded of other such symbols. The graves of our fallen soldiers can serve as a solemn reminder of the grief of their families as well as the incredible bravery and self-sacrifice of our brave men and women. The American flag can remind us of things like freedom, innovation, and unity. But of course, all such things can be misused well, and the people and causes to which they point distorted.

This coming weekend is both difficult and important for those who have lost loved ones in service to their country. May we remember all of these prayerfully, as well as pray for ourselves that we would resist any idolatry and distortion of our symbols and live for the incredible good for which they were meant to stand.


